Bachelor of Arts Folklore Studies College of Arts and Sciences

While Comparative Studies is broadly concerned with the study of culture and cultural differences, students develop particular areas of expertise. The Folklore concentration provides an introduction to the study of folklore methods and folk materials—such everyday activities as riddles, ethnic jokes, urban lengends—that seem unimportant but that are significant in producing identities and strategies of resistance or control. Students develop a particular focus within a particular area to provide depth. That area might be the folklore of a particular geographical region or community, or the study of a particular genre, such as oral narrative or performance. Students will learn how different cultural groups interact among themselves and with others, while focusing their study on particular subjects (verbal arts, material culture, etc.) or particular geographical regions or cultural groups. ⁱ
